

ABOUT CCSD

Established in 1956, the Clark County School District is the fifth-largest school district in the country, educating almost 75 percent of all students in Nevada with more than 320,000 students enrolled in grades K-12. The district offers nationally recognized Magnet Schools and Career & Technical Academies as well as an online secondary school. Services offered by the district also include a school police department, adult education courses, special education, and partnerships with organizations such as Vegas PBS and the Public Education Foundation. As the largest school district in Nevada, CCSD plays a pivotal role in ensuring the future success, growth and advancement of the state.

BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

A seven-member Board of School Trustees establishes CCSD policy and employs the superintendent to serve as chief executive officer. Trustees are elected to four-year terms. Regular meetings of the board are held on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month in the Edward A. Greer Education Center, 2832 E. Flamingo Road. EMPLOYEES

The district employs 41,823 people, including full-time, part-time and temporary employees plus substitutes:

- ◆ 18,656 licensed personnel
- ◆ 11,975 support staff (includes clerical and food service staff, bus drivers, teacher aides, custodians, etc.)
- ◆ 1,371 administrators (principals, deans, central office, etc.)
- ◆ 142 school police
- ◆ 5,136 substitute teachers
- ◆ 4,543 other temporary/substitute employees

TRANSPORTATION

The Clark County School District encompasses all of Clark County, which covers 7,910 square miles and includes the metropolitan Las Vegas area and all outlying communities and rural areas.

- ◆ 1,730 buses
- ◆ 121,047 general education students were eligible for transportation while 16,008 special education students were eligible in the 2015-16 school year
- ◆ More than 23.5 million miles traveled last school year (2015-16)

BUDGET

The general fund operating budget for the 2016-17 school year is \$2.291 billion, with basic per-pupil state funding at \$5,573 and per-pupil expenditures at \$8,512.

Per-pupil expenditures include all funds except capital, debt, food service and internal service funds. The district receives revenue from various sources including:

- ◆ 41.2% local sales tax
- ◆ 31.9% state funding
- ◆ 18.7% property tax funding
- ◆ 5.6% government services tax, federal support, other
- ◆ 2.6% opening fund balance

SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS

A range of programs that meet a broad spectrum of students' educational needs are available. Percentage of students who qualify or participate in specialized programs:

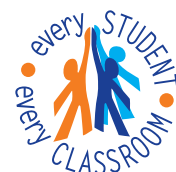
- ◆ 63.55% Free and Reduced Lunch (as of June 30, 2016)
- ◆ 25.4% English Language Learners
- ◆ 11.5% Special Education Services (provided up to age 22)
- ◆ 5.25% Gifted Education Program
