Eleven films by students at Northwest Career & Technical Academy earned awards at the Las Vegas Student Film Festival on April 13, 2012. Among the winners was "Red Mask," which earned a Best Picture award. About a dozen schools in the region compete in the annual festival.

Four students in Ronny Hoffman's French class at Las Vegas Academy finished in the top 10 in the National French Contest/Le Grand Concours, an annual competition sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of French. Students of French in grades 1-12, in all 50 states and abroad, take a written test and compete against students with similar educational background for prizes. All of Hoffman's French II students finished in the top 1- 10% in the nation, and this marks the second consecutive year Hoffman and his students have been nationally ranked.

Sarah MacNab, a teacher at East Career and Technical Academy, has been named a Siemens Teachers as Researchers (STARs) Fellow. She will be among an elite group of 40 educators to spend two immersive weeks at the U.S. Department of Energy's Oak Ridge National Laboratory or Pacific Northwest National Laboratory working on cutting-edge research projects with world class scientists and researchers.

Mack Lyon Middle School students Stetson Rowley and Drake Waite won first place in the humorous interpretation event at a recent middle school forensics tournament. As reported by the Moapa Valley Progress, the event was held May 5, 2012, at Coral Science Academy in Henderson. Bev Bradley serves as coach of Lyon's forensics team.
